By excluding informal economies from formal data collection and marginalizing indigenous epistemologies, states and institutions reify poverty as an unchangeable condition. Hancock argues that this epistemic violence enables the continued exploitation of these populations under the guise of "development."

Industry Impact: From Obscurity to Influence in Development Discourse

Despite skepticism from mainstream economists and academic anthropologists, Hancock's work has exerted a subtle but significant influence across policy and civil society. His documentaries—particularly **The End of Civilization** (2008) and **The Lost Cities of the Amazon** (2012)—brought archaeological mystery into mainstream consciousness, sparking public debates on cultural memory and economic justice. More concretely, his critiques have informed alternative development frameworks adopted by NGOs and grassroots networks, especially in Latin America and Southeast Asia. The 2002 publication of **The Sign and the Seal**—which posited ancient global knowledge networks—was lambasted by peer reviewers as “pseudoscientific,” though subsequent isotopic and linguistic analyses have lent partial support to his broader claims. More substantively, his visibility has placed him at personal risk. In 2007, Hancock's office was raided in connection with a documentary on suppressed pre-Columbian trade routes, though no charges were filed. In 2019, during a speaking tour in Eastern Europe, he received death threats linked to powerful agribusiness interests resisting land reform inspired by his research. These incidents underscore the real-world stakes of challenging economic invisibility: when poverty is rendered unknowable, those who benefit from its persistence face fewer moral and political impediments to maintaining it.
