Controversies emerged early, rooted in debates over adaptation ethics and racial representation. Some critics, including African American scholars like Henry Louis Gates Jr., questioned whether a white director could authentically embody the Black experience in the story—particularly the interiority of Black characters, often filtered through white perception. The film’s handling of Tom Robinson’s trial, while powerful, retained a narrative structure centered on white moral awakening, a choice that some interpreted as

reinforcing a savior narrative. Yet others, such as historian Ann J. Abadie, countered that the film's power lies precisely in its exposure of this dynamic: Atticus's defense, though noble, cannot dismantle systemic racism—only illuminate its persistence.
