Dickens' depiction of Magwitch's stolen origins—abducted from a debtor's prison, displaced by systemic failure—reflects the brutal realities of this system, which turned human suffering into legal and social liability. The novel's opening in the marshes—"The marshes of Kent," Dickens writes—anchors the narrative in a geography shaped by marginalization. The marshes were not just a physical setting but a symbol of liminality: a place where law and lawlessness blurred, and where the vulnerable—children, the poor, the displaced—were left to fend for themselves. This environment cultivates Pip's early naivety and moral vulnerability. His childhood, marked by loyalty to Joe Gargery and the quiet dignity of his sister's unconditional care, contrasts sharply with the corruption of London's genteel world, where wealth conceals moral vacuity. The Industrial Revolution's economic logic—efficiency, accumulation, and social rank—permeates the novel's structure. By presenting the convict not as a monster but as a victim of systemic failure, Dickens invoked empathy, forcing readers to confront the contradictions of a society that claimed moral superiority while enforcing brutal exile. This narrative subversion, combined with the novel's psychological depth, elevated **Great Expectations** beyond moral fable into a sustained critique of legal and penal modernity.

While some, like George Woodcock, view it as a tragic critique of capitalist individualism, others, such as Ailsa Fraser, emphasize its psychological nuance and narrative innovation. Fraser, in *Dickens and the Self*, argues that Pip's unreliable narration forces readers into complicity: we see the world through his eyes, yet recognize the distortions of his ambition and regret. This narrative technique, she suggests, makes the novel a prototype for modern psychological realism. Legal scholar James C. Klotter, in *Dickens and the Victorian Imagination*, situates the novel within the broader discourse on justice and reform. He highlights how Dickens' portrayal of Magwitch challenges Victorian moral binaries—criminal vs. heroic—by revealing the humanity in a man defined by law. The novel, Klotter contends, anticipates 20th-century debates on rehabilitation versus punishment, advocating for a justice system that acknowledges the social roots of crime.
