The rise of export-oriented aquaculture—tilapia, shrimp—promises growth but risks introducing disease and pollution if poorly managed. Ahmed Kassim, CEO of a major Tanzanian fisheries cooperative, notes, “We are investing in sustainable quotas and traceability to access global markets. The future of our industry depends on ecological integrity.” Yet critics caution that without independent oversight, such commitments risk greenwashing.

On the ground, fishers like Hassan Mwinyi of Mombasa recall the transformation: “Twenty years ago, the sea

gave freely. Now, we fish farther, use more gear, and catch less. The government says it’s progress, but we see the depletion.” Their testimony underscores a central tension: the seashore is both sustenance and battleground.

Controversies and Conflicts: Sovereignty, Pollution, and Power
