Its use of documentary techniques blurred fiction and propaganda, but its enduring power lies in its unflinching portrayal of counterinsurgency violence. The film was banned in France for decades, then studied at military academies worldwide—including the U.S. Army's counterinsurgency training—highlighting cinema's role not just as art, but as strategic document. Similarly, **Half of a Yellow Sun** (2013), adapted from Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's novel, confronts the Biafran War with narrative precision, challenging dominant Western narratives of African conflict. These films are not passive reflections—they actively shape collective memory and geopolitical understanding. Controversy is intrinsic to such works. **The Act of Killing** (2012), Joshua Oppenheimer's documentary on Indonesian death squad leaders, provoked global outrage by forcing perpetrators to reenact their crimes in cinematic genres—musicals, westerns, noir. The film's method—exposing moral rot through artistic distortion—sparked debates on ethics, representation, and the limits of cinematic truth.
