Yet this assertion emerges amid a political climate where propaganda and censorship tightly regulated expression. The

poem's quiet defiance lies in its claim to transcend temporal decay—a metaphysical resistance to the volatility of courtly favor and public opinion. The evolution of Shakespeare's poetic voice reflects broader shifts in literary economy and patronage. The 1590s saw the rise of the "little book" market, enabled by advances in printing technology and rising literacy among the urban bourgeoisie. Shakespeare's poems circulated in quarto form, often pirated and revised in response to demand. Controversies surrounding authorship and authenticity have long shadowed Shakespeare’s poetic legacy. In Japan, during the Meiji era, Shakespearean lyricism influenced modernist poets like Masaoka Shiki, who saw in the sonnet a model for capturing ephemeral sensation.
