His career, spanning over three decades, mirrors the transformation of materials engineering from niche research to geopolitical leverage, economic disruption, and existential risk. The origins of modern materials science engineering are rooted in the mid-20th century, a crucible of

Cold War urgency and technological ambition. Yet the future is not without peril. As materials become more complex and integrated with AI, the potential for systemic failure grows. A flaw in a widely used AI-optimized alloy could cascade across critical infrastructure. Cybersecurity threats to material databases, supply chain AI systems, and fabrication equipment introduce new vectors of disruption. Khanna's call for "materials security"—a holistic framework integrating physical, digital, and institutional safeguards—has gained urgency in light of recent incidents: a 2023 ransomware attack on a semiconductor plant halted production for weeks, revealing fragility in digitized manufacturing. In academic circles, debates rage over whether openness can coexist with national security imperatives. Some argue that strategic materials must remain protected; others, following Khanna, see transparency as the ultimate security mechanism. His argument—that open science fosters faster, more robust innovation, reducing the chance of catastrophic failure—is supported by recent breakthroughs in perovskite solar cells and solid-state batteries, both accelerated by shared data ecosystems.
