This textual dispersal underscores the **Tales**’ organic development—composed for performance, recitation, and adaptation, not for fixed print. Chaucer’s dialect choices are deeply tied to the geography and social hierarchy of his time. The East Anglian inflections in the Wife of Bath’s speech reflect her origins in Norfolk; the Cockney cadences of the Wife’s Talekeeper reveal London’s mercantile heart. These regional markers were not arbitrary: they functioned as narrative signifiers, allowing audiences to identify characters by voice—a technique later echoed in radio drama and podcast narration. Yet, within this diversity, Chaucer orchestrates a deliberate symmetry: the pilgrims’ stories, though linguistically distinct, converge on universal themes—love, greed, redemption—creating a polyphonic whole. The manuscript evidence shows that Chaucer revised and expanded the work iteratively, responding to audience reception and evolving literary tastes. This flexibility contrasts sharply with modern translation practices, where fixed text often suppresses the fluidity of narrative perspective. The survival of these manuscripts was precarious. The Reformation’s iconoclasm and 18th-century bibliophilic purges threatened many medieval texts; only through the efforts of collectors like Sir Thomas Herbert and institutions such as the Bodleian Library did the **Canterbury Tales** endure. The 19th-century Romantic revival elevated Chaucer to national icon status, prompting critical editions that standardized spelling and syntax—standardization that, while preserving the text, obscured its dialectal richness. Modern scholars now use digital tools—OCR scanning, corpus linguistics, and phonetic modeling—to reconstruct dialectal contours and performance contexts, reviving the manuscript’s original vibrancy. This digital

recontextualization transforms the *Tales* from a static artifact into a dynamic linguistic ecosystem, revealing how Chaucer's work was shaped by, and in turn shaped, the oral and written cultures of his age.

The Early Print Culture and the Erasure of Dialect

The first printed edition, published anonymously in 1476 by William Caxton, marked a pivotal shift in Chaucer's reception. Caxton's press, based in Westminster, produced the *Canterbury Tales* in Middle English but with increasing standardization—altering spelling, simplifying syntax, and smoothing dialectal variation to enhance intelligibility for a growing literate middle class. This editorial intervention reflected broader trends: the rise of printed texts as symbols of cultural unity and the diminishing role of oral performance in literary transmission. By the late 16th century, Chaucer's dialect was widely perceived as “vulgar,” a relic of a less refined past, paving the way for the 18th-century neoclassical critique that dismissed his speech as unlettered. This linguistic purism had profound consequences. The *Canterbury Tales* were increasingly taught not as a living narrative experiment but as a historical curiosity, its dialect filtered through prescriptive grammar and modernized vocabulary. This process mirrored the marginalization of regional English varieties across Britain, from Cockney to Geordie, as Standard English became the gatekeeper of education and social mobility. The manuscript evidence, however, resists this simplification: paleographic analysis reveals marginalia, corrections, and performance notes suggesting that Chaucer's work was actively engaged with, debated, and adapted in public spaces. The 19th-century Oxford Chaucer Project, initiated in the 1920s, sought to recover this lost vitality. Using comparative manuscript analysis, scholars like Eric A. Thompson and later David Scott Kastan reconstructed Chaucer's dialectal range with unprecedented precision. They identified regional speech patterns, metrical innovations, and narrative techniques—such as the use of irony through understatement or direct address—that had been obscured by centuries of editorial smoothing. This scholarly revival laid the groundwork for modern reinterpretations, emphasizing that Chaucer's genius lay not in linguistic purity, but in his mastery of narrative diversity.

This structure invites readers to recognize multiple perspectives within a single journey, a technique now central to postmodern fiction and interactive storytelling. The Pardoner, for instance, is both a manipulative fraud and a self-aware commentator on ecclesiastical corruption. The Wife of Bath's prologue blends personal narrative with feminist argument, challenging medieval gender norms while engaging with contemporary debates on marriage and female agency. These layered portrayals resonate with modern narrative theory's emphasis on unreliable narration, character interiority, and ideological critique. The global diffusion of Chaucer's work further underscores its narrative universality. In the 20th century, translations and adaptations spread across continents: the Wife of Bath's tale appeared in feminist anthologies alongside Virginia Woolf's *Orlando*; the Miller's bawdy humor influenced comic writing from Oscar Wilde to contemporary sketch comedy. In postcolonial literatures, Chaucer's frame narrative has
