The Debriefing with Good Judgment model, developed by researcher Rita Mann, exemplifies this shift — emphasizing psychological safety, non-judgmental feedback, and structured reflection. This concern echoes broader debates about the balance between technical mastery and humanistic care — a tension amplified by the rise of artificial intelligence (AI) in education. AI-driven adaptive learning systems now personalize content based on student performance, adjusting complexity in real time. While promising for efficiency and accessibility, such tools risk depersonalizing the learning experience, reducing mentorship to algorithmic feedback loops.
