The 2022 Russian blockade of Ukrainian grain exports, for instance, sent global wheat prices soaring, exposing how cereal—ostensibly a breakfast staple—fuels geopolitical leverage. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that 40% of global wheat trade passes through Black Sea corridors; disruptions cascade through breakfast tables from Warsaw to Jakarta. This interdependence turns cereal into a strategic commodity,

where food security and national sovereignty intersect. Industry consolidation has further concentrated power. By the 2000s, six corporations controlled over 80% of the global breakfast cereal market. Kellogg’s, General Mills, Nestlé, PepsiCo, Danone, and Post Holdings dominate shelf space, with R&D budgets rivaling those of tech firms. Mergers and acquisitions—such as Post’s purchase of Nature’s Path or General Mills’ acquisition of Annie’s—reflect a strategy of diversification into “natural” and “organic” segments, responding to shifting consumer demands while preserving core processed lines. But this consolidation raises antitrust concerns. A 2023 OECD report warned that concentrated cereal markets reduce innovation, inflate prices, and homogenize diets—especially in low-income urban areas where choice is limited to a handful of global brands. Expert analysis reveals a growing unease within the public health community. Dr. Marion Nestle, professor emeritus at NYU and author of , argues that cereal exemplifies the “nutritional paradox”: products fortified to fix diet flaws while embodying the flaws themselves. “We market cereals as solutions to sugar, fat, and fiber deficiencies,” she writes, “yet their formulations often replicate
