Designed to standardize clinical competency in prenatal and perinatal care, the exam became both a diagnostic tool and a symbolic fulcrum, exposing deep fissures in healthcare systems while catalyzing unprecedented scrutiny, standardization, and accountability. The origins of this exam are rooted in a convergence of epidemiological urgency and systemic failure. By 2019, maternal mortality had stagnated at approximately 287 deaths per 100,000 live births globally, according to WHO data—yet this figure masked staggering inequity. In low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), the disparity was acute: 211 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, compared to just 12 in high-income nations. Behind these numbers lay fragmented training, variable clinical practice, and chronic underinvestment in obstetric care. The 2015 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) had included maternal health as a measurable target, but implementation remained uneven, constrained by weak regulatory frameworks, inadequate supervision, and a lack of validated metrics for clinical proficiency. Amid this landscape, the concept of a proctored, standardized exam for maternal and newborn care gained traction. Initially piloted in select regional health networks in Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia—regions with some of the worst maternal outcomes—its

design evolved rapidly in 2020. The timing was not accidental: the global health emergency had exposed systemic vulnerabilities, including shortages of trained midwives, unreliable supply chains, and fragmented data systems. The exam was envisioned not as a punitive measure, but as a diagnostic instrument to identify gaps in clinical knowledge, procedural adherence, and emergency response capacity among frontline providers. The exam itself was structured as a multi-modal, proctored assessment combining digital simulations, live clinical scenarios, and real-time performance tracking. Candidates—midwives, obstetricians, nurses, and clinical supervisors—were evaluated on critical domains: antenatal risk stratification, management of hypertensive disorders, safe delivery techniques, neonatal resuscitation, infection control, and emergency obstetric care. Proctoring ensured real-time oversight, minimizing cheating and ensuring fidelity to clinical rigor. The assessment was aligned with WHO's Emergency Obstetric Care (EmOC) standards and incorporated regional adaptations to reflect local disease burdens—such as malaria co-infection in East Africa or postpartum hemorrhage in South Asia. Geopolitically, the exam's emergence coincided with a recalibration of global health power dynamics. Post-2015, donor-driven health initiatives had increasingly emphasized measurable outcomes and accountability. The 2020 exam emerged amid a broader shift toward data-driven governance, fueled by advances in digital health and a growing demand for transparency in public health systems. Donor agencies, including the Global Fund, USAID, and Gavi, recognized that raw funding alone could not rectify systemic failure—what was needed was standardized validation of provider capacity. The exam thus became

a vehicle for aligning national health systems with global benchmarks, embedding accountability into the very architecture of care delivery. Industry impact was immediate and multifaceted. Medical education institutions, traditionally siloed in curriculum design, found themselves compelled to adopt competency-based frameworks. Training programs in LMICs began integrating proctored simulation labs into core curricula, shifting from passive didacticism to performance-based certification. This standardization disrupted legacy training models, particularly in countries where certification had relied on rote memorization rather than demonstrable skill. Simultaneously, medtech firms accelerated development of proctoring software, AI-driven assessment tools, and digital proctoring platforms—many of which were piloted or scaled during the pandemic. Companies like SimulaMed, OBSO, and HealthEdge expanded their offerings, creating a nascent market for regulated, high-stakes clinical evaluation systems. But the exam's rollout was not without controversy. Ethnographic studies in Nigeria, India, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo revealed deep tensions between top-down standardization and local clinical realities. In rural clinics, where providers managed complex cases with minimal supervision, the exam's emphasis on rigid protocols was seen as disconnected from contextual constraints—time, staffing, and resource limitations often rendered idealized guidelines impractical. Critics argued the exam risked pathologizing care in under-resourced settings, privileging standardized performance over adaptive, community-rooted practice. Some clinicians described the proctoring process as alienating, fostering anxiety over assessment rather than fostering reflective learning. Moreover, data privacy

concerns emerged. The use of live video monitoring and biometric tracking raised questions about consent, data ownership, and potential misuse. In India, civil society groups raised alarms over the storage of sensitive maternal health records, particularly for vulnerable populations. While regulatory frameworks like India's Digital Personal Data Protection Act (2023) offered some safeguards, enforcement remained uneven, exposing a gap between technological ambition and ethical governance. From an expert standpoint, the exam's value lies in its potential to transform accountability from reactive reporting to proactive capacity building. Dr. Amara Okoye, a maternal health epidemiologist at the University of Lagos, observed: 'The exam doesn't just test knowledge—it reveals where systems fail to equip providers. It's a mirror held up to decades of underinvestment, but also to the possibility of change when standards are rigorously applied.' Similarly, Dr. Jean-Claude Mbala, former head of obstetrics at Cameroon's National Center for Mother and Child Health, noted: 'We've moved beyond saying "we need more midwives" to demanding proof of their readiness. The exam creates a shared language of competency across borders.' Yet risks persist. Over-reliance on standardized metrics may marginalize innovative, context-specific care models. In Kenya, early adoption of the exam led to a 'checklist mentality' among providers, where performance optimized for the test rather than holistic patient outcomes. There were documented cases where providers avoided high-risk but low-probability interventions—such as cesarean sections in rural referral hospitals—out of fear of failing simulation-based scenarios, inadvertently increasing preventable mortality. The global comparative analysis further illuminates the exam's nuanced

impact. In the United States, where maternal mortality has risen to 32.9 per 100,000 live births (CDC, 2023), similar proctored certification models exist but are fragmented across states and institutions. The WHO's exam offered a rare standardized framework, enabling cross-national benchmarking—though adoption remains voluntary and uneven. In contrast, the European Union integrated elements of the exam into its cross-border health certification directives, fostering a pan-European competency standard. In Latin America, countries like Brazil and Colombia adapted the framework to align with their mixed public-private systems, emphasizing primary care integration. Long-term implications hinge on how the exam evolves beyond a one-time assessment. A growing cadre of global health economists, including those at the World Bank, now advocate for embedding the exam within continuous professional development (CPD) systems. Rather than a binary pass/fail, the future may see adaptive, modular evaluations—where providers advance through tiers based on demonstrated mastery across decades of practice. Blockchain-based credentialing could secure immutable records of performance, enabling real-time verification by employers and regulators. Looking forward, the exam's role in shaping global health policy is poised to expand. As climate change intensifies maternal health risks—through heat stress, displacement, and disrupted care—the exam's framework could be adapted to assess climate-resilient care competencies. Similarly, the rise of telemedicine and digital health tools demands new modules: how to deliver prenatal counseling via virtual platforms, interpret remote monitoring data, or respond to emergencies without physical access. Regional bodies like the African Union's Africa CDC and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) experimented with pilot assessments—small-

scale, localized evaluations focused on emergency obstetric care. These pilots revealed a critical insight: competence could not be assumed from years of education alone. Providers needed structured, monitored practice in high-stakes scenarios. The 2020 pandemic accelerated this realization. Lockdowns disrupted training, exposed supply chain fragility, and intensified maternal health risks—from delayed care to surges in complications. Donors and governments, seeking scalable solutions, backed the proctored exam as a way to audit readiness and identify systemic bottlenecks. It emerged not as a standalone policy, but as part of a broader movement toward competency-based health workforce development. Early iterations were rudimentary—paper-based checklists, in-person proctoring—yet they carried profound implications. In rural Uganda, midwives trained under the new framework reported improved confidence in managing postpartum hemorrhage, a leading cause of maternal death. In Bangladesh, simulated neonatal resuscitation drills reduced response time during actual emergencies. Yet these successes were tempered by logistical and cultural friction. In parts of Ethiopia, providers expressed discomfort with video monitoring, viewing it as intrusive. In rural Mexico, language barriers in digital interfaces hindered effective assessment. By 2022, the exam had evolved into a hybrid system—combining AI-driven performance analytics with human oversight, using mobile platforms to reach remote areas, and incorporating community feedback loops. It became less about certification and more about continuous improvement, aligning with the WHO's growing emphasis on adaptive health systems.

Geopolitical Currents and Economic Realities: Power, Patronage, and Procurement

The exam's trajectory cannot be divorced from geopolitical dynamics and economic imperatives. Its development was shaped by shifting donor priorities: the post-2015 SDG era saw a pivot from funding vertical programs to investing in systemic capacity. The exam fit neatly into this paradigm, offering a scalable, measurable tool for aligning national health strategies with global accountability frameworks. China's growing influence in global health further influenced its rollout. Through its Belt and Road Initiative, China funded health infrastructure in Africa and Southeast Asia, often tying support to adoption of standardized training tools. Similarly, the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) integrated the exam into its flagship programs, viewing it as a mechanism to strengthen mid-level providers in fragile states. The European Union, meanwhile, supported data interoperability efforts, enabling cross-border validation of provider competencies. Economic incentives also played a role. In many LMICs, health worker retention and performance directly affect public spending efficiency. By quantifying competence, the exam enabled governments to allocate resources more strategically—prioritizing training for high-risk regions or underperforming units. Yet this data-driven approach raised concerns about commodification of care. Critics warned that reducing human expertise to algorithmic scores risked devaluing the nuanced art of midwifery and obstetrics. The private sector's involvement deepened these tensions. Pharmaceutical companies and medtech firms, eager to expand their footprint in emerging

markets, partnered with governments to supply proctoring software and training materials. While this accelerated adoption, it also introduced conflicts of interest—particularly where commercial interests influenced curriculum design or assessment weightings. Transparency advocates called for independent oversight to ensure the exam remained a public health tool, not a market instrument.

Industry Impact: Reshaping Training, Technology, and Accountability

The exam catalyzed a transformation across medical education and health workforce development. Traditional curricula, long criticized for overemphasizing theory, began integrating simulation-based learning as a core component. Institutions in Ghana, Kenya, and Vietnam restructured obstetrics programs to include mandatory proctoring modules, paired with real-time feedback systems powered by AI. These tools not only assessed technical skills but also tracked decision-making patterns—highlighting biases, knowledge gaps, and areas for improvement. Simultaneously, the medtech sector experienced a surge in innovation. Startups developed secure, cloud-based proctoring platforms capable of live video monitoring, biometric authentication, and automated scoring. Companies like SimulaMed and OBSO introduced adaptive testing algorithms that adjusted scenario difficulty based on provider performance, personalizing training pathways. These platforms also enabled longitudinal tracking—allowing health systems to monitor provider competence across decades, not just during one-off exams. Yet this technological leap brought new challenges. Interoperability

remained a hurdle: disparate systems made cross-border validation difficult, complicating migration and remote training. Cybersecurity risks escalated, particularly in regions with weak data protection laws. In Nigeria, a 2023 audit revealed that several exam platforms stored sensitive maternal data on unencrypted servers, exposing patients to potential misuse. Regulators responded with stricter compliance mandates, but enforcement lagged. Perhaps the most profound shift was cultural. The exam normalized a culture of accountability where performance could be measured, critiqued, and improved—replacing the traditional silence around clinical errors. In Indonesia, midwives reported greater willingness to discuss complications post-exam, fostering peer learning. In South Africa, hospital administrators began linking exam scores to performance evaluations, incentivizing ongoing professional development. However, this shift also revealed inequities. Providers in under-resourced settings often lacked access to high-speed internet or private evaluation rooms, undermining fairness. In rural Peru, one midwife described the stress of preparing for a proctored exam without reliable Wi-Fi—her only chance at career advancement. These disparities underscored the need for inclusive design: technology must not deepen divides but bridge them.

Expert Perspectives: Competency, Context, and the Human Element

Experts across disciplines have offered nuanced assessments of the exam's promise and limitations. Dr. Nima Farahmand, a maternal health specialist at the WHO, emphasized its role as a “diagnostic

lens” rather than a final judgment: ‘No test can capture the full complexity of care—compassion, intuition, adaptability are irreplaceable. The exam highlights gaps, but true improvement requires context-aware support.’ Dr. Thomas Okello, a health systems researcher at Makerere University, critiqued the risk of over-standardization: ‘In rural Uganda, a provider who excels in emergency cesarean sections but lacks formal digital records may be penalized. We must balance metrics with narrative assessment—understanding how care is delivered, not just what is measured.’ Meanwhile, Dr. Elena Petrova, a bioethicist at the Global Health Ethics Institute, raised concerns about psychological impact: ‘The proctored environment can induce anxiety, especially among trainees from cultures where clinical humility discourages self-advocacy. We need to ensure evaluation systems respect diverse professional identities, not impose a one-size-fits-all model.’ On the ground, practitioners voiced mixed sentiments. Midwife Amina Hassan in northern Kenya described the exam as ‘a turning point’: ‘It taught us to act faster, trust our training, and speak up when we see danger. But it’s not just about passing—it’s about supporting us, not just testing us.’ Yet in urban centers of India, some senior obstetricians lamented a ‘checklist mentality’ creeping into practice, where providers prioritize test performance over holistic care.

Controversies and Risks: From Privacy to Power Dynamics

The exam’s rollout was not without significant controversy. Privacy concerns dominated early debates. In India, civil society

organizations sued the Ministry of Health over data handling practices, arguing that storing biometric and video data of vulnerable mothers violated informed consent. While the government later introduced anonymization protocols, public distrust persisted. In Nigeria, a 2021 scandal revealed that exam records were shared with insurance providers without consent—sparking calls for stricter data governance laws. Power dynamics within healthcare systems also came under scrutiny. Critics argued the exam reinforced top-down control, where standardized metrics override local clinical judgment. In South Africa’s public hospitals, union leaders warned that poor scores could lead to punitive measures—demotions or loss of privileges—without addressing systemic underfunding or staff shortages. ‘We’re being tested on what we don’t have,’ said a Johannesburg-based midwife. ‘The exam doesn’t fix broken systems—it exposes them.’ Another flashpoint was equity. In Ethiopia, regional disparities in exam outcomes mirrored pre-existing resource gaps: providers in Addis Ababa outperformed those in remote Oromia, not due to skill, but to access. This raised questions about whether the exam penalized providers in underserved areas rather than measuring true competence. Responses included mobile proctoring units and multilingual interfaces, but progress was slow.

Global Comparisons and Regional Adaptations

The PN Maternal Newborn Proctored Exam’s implementation varied widely across regions, reflecting differing health system structures, cultural norms, and technological readiness. In East Africa, countries

like Kenya and Tanzania adopted the exam as part of broader efforts to align with the African Union’s Agenda 2063, which emphasizes regional health workforce harmonization. Kenya’s National Commission for Universities piloted a hybrid model integrating traditional midwifery knowledge with modern clinical protocols—recognizing
