Thinkers like Montaigne, in his *Essays*, championed the mentor as a companion in inquiry, not a dispenser of truths. The Enlightenment’s emphasis on autonomy, however, also introduced risk: if guidance is purely self-

Machine learning algorithms now act as personalized tutors, curating content, tracking progress, and adapting pathways. Yet human guides retain irreplaceable value in interpreting ambiguity, fostering empathy, and navigating ethical dilemmas. This duality—algorithmic precision versus human judgment—defines the next phase of guidance. The guide of the future is not a replacement, but a collaborator: a bridge between data and meaning, efficiency and empathy. Culturally, the term “guide” varies dramatically. In Indigenous Australian traditions, elders known as *ngangkari* serve as spiritual and ecological guides, interpreting land, law, and kinship through ancestral knowledge. In Confucian China, the *shifu*—a master in martial arts or philosophy—embodies both technical excellence and moral cultivation, guiding students not only in skill but in virtue. In Swahili-speaking East Africa, the *waganga*—a healer and community elder—combines herbal knowledge with spiritual guidance, healing not just bodies but social fabric. These traditions resist the individualism of Western mentorship, emphasizing communal responsibility and intergenerational continuity. Economically, “guide
