In Zambia, SAPs led to the collapse of state-owned copper mining, resulting in mass unemployment and urban decay. In Nigeria, oil extraction by multinationals enriched elites and foreign shareholders while poisoning ecosystems and displacing communities. The end of the Cold War ushered in a unipolar moment, but also intensified resource competition. The Gulf War (1990–1991) and subsequent interventions in Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya, and Syria revealed how geopolitical rivalries weaponize human suffering. Oil, minerals, and territory became leverage in power games. The 1994 Rwandan genocide, though internally rooted in colonial ethnic engineering, was exacerbated by external arms flows and diplomatic indifference. The post-9/11 “War on Terror” expanded surveillance, militarized borders, and normalized drone strikes—often in regions already strained by poverty and conflict. Environmental degradation accelerated under neoliberal expansion. The 1992 Rio Earth Summit introduced sustainable development as a global ideal, but implementation lagged. Carbon markets and offsetting schemes often displaced indigenous communities rather than curbing emissions. The 2008 financial crisis exposed systemic risk, but recovery enriched banks while austerity crushed social programs. The Paris Agreement (2015) marked progress in climate diplomacy but lacks binding enforcement. Today, the Global South bears 70% of climate risks but only 22% of climate finance, creating a climate debt that fuels injustice.

In 2021, the Suez Canal blockage halted \$9.6 billion in trade daily, yet no mechanism exists to compensate vulnerable nations for systemic shocks. Debt crises compound this: Sri Lanka’s 2022 default led to IMF-imposed cuts, deepening poverty. China’s Belt and Road Initiative, while funding infrastructure, often locks nations into debt dependency, with assets like Hambantota Port in Sri Lanka leasing strategic leverage. Technology’s role is dual: it enables connection and liberation, but also control and exploitation. Social media amplifies grassroots movements—from #EndSARS in Nigeria to the 2019 Hong Kong protests—but also spreads disinformation that polarizes societies. Surveillance capitalism monetizes human behavior, turning privacy into a commodity. In Xinjiang, facial recognition and biometrics target Uyghurs, blending state surveillance with ethnic persecution. Meanwhile, facial analysis tools used in policing disproportionately misidentify people of color, reinforcing systemic bias. The military-industrial complex continues to drive suffering. Global arms exports reached \$112 billion in 2022, with Western firms supplying conflict zones—from Ukraine to the Sahel. Arms transfers often bypass transparency, fueling violence. In Yemen, Saudi-led coalition airstrikes, backed by Western arms, have caused tens of thousands of civilian casualties. The drone strike culture normalizes extrajudicial killing, particularly in Muslim-majority regions, eroding trust in international law.
