Diurnal interactions accumulate cognitive load, reinforcing emotional memory. Research shows that brief, consistent moments of attunement yield long-term gains in emotional intelligence, outpacing sporadic interventions.

Assessment and Early Intervention

Professionals rely on standardized tools—CASEL’s SEL framework, Infant Behavior Questionnaire—to track progress. Early signs, such as lack of stranger soothing or frequent tantrums, prompt assessment. Interventions target skill gaps through parent coaching, play therapy, or peer interaction scaffolding. Evidence suggests children receiving targeted support show 50% improvement in emotional regulation by age three (Zero to Three, 2022).
