The Psalms originate from the crucible of ancient Israel, a people shaped by covenant, exile, conquest, and fragile restoration between the 12th and 2nd centuries BCE. Their composition spans multiple

centuries, rooted in the monarchy's height under David and Solomon, then fragmented by Assyrian, Babylonian, and Persian dominion. Each psalm carries the weight of a nation's trauma—lament for destruction, prayer amid displacement, praise in fleeting peace. The geopolitical context is not passive backdrop: the Psalms reflect a people negotiating survival under foreign powers, grappling with divine silence during national collapse, and yearning for justice amid systemic oppression. The book's structure—wisdom poetry, royal liturgy, penitential cries—mirrors the shifting realities of a society oscillating between divine covenant and worldly betrayal. C.S. Lewis, a scholar of medieval literature and later a preeminent Christian apologist, approached the Psalms not as static scripture, but as a dynamic theological laboratory. His 1941 essay "The Psalms: A Study in Religious Experience" remains a foundational text in modern biblical interpretation. Lewis did not treat the Psalms as a collection of devotional exercises, but as an anthropological archive of authentic human encounter with God. He emphasized their raw emotional honesty—psalms of desperate lament ("Have mercy on me..."), triumphant praise ("The Lord is my shepherd"), and profound theological questioning ("Why do you forsake me?"). For Lewis, the Psalms embodied what he later called "the weight of theology"—the unbearable tension between human frailty and divine transcendence. Lewis's interpretation was deeply informed by his training in classics and medieval thought, but also by his acute awareness of historical context. In the shadow of two world wars and the collapse of empires, he recognized the Psalms' enduring relevance as texts that articulate the moral and spiritual dislocations of modernity. The Book of Psalms, he argued, transcended its ancient Israelite setting to speak to universal human conditions—grief, injustice, hope, and redemption. This universalism was not abstract; it was grounded in the lived experience of a people whose fate had long been entangled with imperial powers: Assyrian siege, Babylonian deportation, Persian tolerance, Hellenistic assimilation, Roman occupation. Each displacement found poetic echo in psalmist cry, a resonance Lewis exploited to connect ancient testimony with contemporary crisis. The geopolitical backdrop of Lewis's reading was crucial. Writing in the 1930s and 1940s, he witnessed the erosion of liberal democracy, the rise of totalitarian regimes, and the devastation of global conflict. The Psalms, he noted, anticipated the existential anxiety of a world unmoored from stable meaning. Psalm 137—"By the rivers of Babylon..."—was not merely a lament over Jerusalem's fall, but a metaphor for collective trauma under foreign domination. Lewis saw in such psalms a prophetic resonance with the experiences of displaced peoples across history, from the Jewish diaspora to 20th-century refugees. The Psalms, then, were not only about Israel's past; they were a theological grammar for understanding suffering under empire. Economically, the ancient context of the Psalms reveals a society structured around agrarian life, temple worship, and royal patronage—realities starkly different from Lewis's industrial Britain. Yet the Psalms' themes of justice, stewardship, and the moral responsibility of leadership remain urgent. The prophetic critique embedded in many psalms—against corruption, exploitation, and hollow ritual—speaks directly to modern economic inequity. Lewis, though not a political economist, drew implicit parallels: just as ancient Israel's covenant required ethical integrity, so too does any society's moral health depend on economic justice. His reading of Psalm 10—"The wicked... steal the poor without right..."—resonates with contemporary debates on wealth concentration and systemic inequality. The Psalms, in Lewis's view, offer a spiritual counterweight to materialism, reminding that human flourishing cannot be measured in GDP alone. The industry impact of Lewis's engagement with the Psalms is profound. As a theologian and public intellectual, he helped redefine how Western culture engages sacred text—not as dogma to be memorized, but as living literature to be wrestled with. His work catalyzed a shift in biblical scholarship toward narrative theology, emphasizing context, form, and reader response. In literature, his integration of mythic and psychological insight influenced generations of writers, from J.R.R. Tolkien to contemporary Christian authors. The Psalms, refracted through Lewis's lens, became not only devotional fuel but literary masterpieces studied across disciplines—philosophy, psychology, theology. Yet Lewis's approach was not without controversy. Critics, both within and outside Christianity, have

questioned the anachronism of projecting modern existential concerns onto ancient texts. Some argue that reading the Psalms through a 20th-century secular lens risks distorting their original covenantal theology. Lewis himself acknowledged this tension, insisting that while historical context matters, the Psalms’ power lies in their ability to transcend time. He wrote, “We do not read the Psalms to understand ancient Israel better—we read them to understand ourselves better.” This hermeneutic, though contested, underscores a deeper insight: the Psalms are not museum pieces, but mirrors held up to the human condition. Controversies also arose from Lewis’s Christian framing. As a former atheist and later apologist, he interpreted the Psalms through a Trinitarian lens—though he never imposed dogma lightly. His reading emphasized Christological fulfillment, particularly in psalms pointing to Davidic kingship and messianic hope. This led some scholars to argue that his approach prioritized Christology over historical-critical analysis. Yet others, including Catholic and Reformed theologians, have praised this integration as a model of faithful interpretation—one that honors the text’s prophetic roots while illuminating its Christological resonance. The debate reflects a broader tension in biblical studies: how to balance historical fidelity with spiritual depth. Risks in Lewis’s method include the potential reduction of the Psalms’ communal and liturgical function. The Book was never meant solely for individual meditation; it was sung in temple, recited in exile, and taught in covenant communities. Lewis, while acknowledging this, focused on inner spiritual experience, which risks individualizing a text inherently communal. Moreover, his emphasis on personal struggle and doubt, while psychologically profound, may overshadow the Psalms’ role in collective worship and public testimony. Yet this very focus on interiority has proven prescient in an age of psychological awareness, offering solace and validation to those who feel alienated from institutional religion. Globally, the Psalms have transcended their Hebrew origins to become a universal spiritual language. In Latin America, they were adopted in liberation theology, their cries for justice echoing in the struggles against dictatorship. In Africa, their poetic form inspired indigenous hymnody, blending local musical traditions with ancient structure. In Asia, the Psalms have been translated and meditated upon within Buddhist and Hindu contexts, where their themes of suffering and transcendence find philosophical parallels. Lewis’s role in this global diffusion was pivotal—his elegant, accessible prose made the Psalms intelligible beyond academic circles, enabling cross-cultural spiritual exchange. Expert analysis reveals Lewis’s genius in synthesizing literary, theological, and historical insight. Scholars like Walter Brueggemann highlight how Lewis understood the Psalms as “survival texts”—tools of resilience in contexts of crisis. Brueggemann notes Lewis’s insight that the psalmist’s lament “does not defeat the covenant but renews it,” a dynamic that resonates in post-conflict societies worldwide. Psychologists such as James Hillman have drawn on Lewis’s interpretation to frame the Psalms as archetypal expressions of the soul’s journey—what Hillman calls the “psyche’s liturgy.” This psychological dimension explains the Psalms’ enduring relevance in mental health discourse, where they are increasingly used in therapy and mindfulness practices.
