Unlike linear line charts, which flattened time into abstraction, candlesticks encoded price movement in temporal slices—each bar a snapshot of open, high, low, close, and time—transforming ephemeral swings into legible narratives. The system crystallized through the work of Munehiro Kiyotaki and later, more famously, in the 1930s with the publication of *The Candlestick Chart* by Japanese analyst Shōkichi Hoshino, whose diagrams were later popularized in the West by Thomas Garrett in *Japanese Candlestick Charting Techniques*.
