His Virginia Plan proposed a bicameral legislature, proportional representation, and a strong executive—ideas that alarmed smaller states but laid the groundwork for a national government with distinct branches. Yet, the real breakthrough came not from theory alone but from compromise. The Great Compromise (Connecticut Plan) balanced large and small states through a Senate with equal representation, while the Three-Fifths Compromise, though morally abhorrent, secured Southern support by counting enslaved people partially for representation—embedding slavery into the constitutional architecture of federal power. Equally pivotal was the creation of federal supremacy. The Supremacy Clause (Article VI) and the Necessary and Proper Clause established that national law would override conflicting state statutes, a radical departure from confederal norms. This was not merely legal innovation but geopolitical necessity: to project power abroad, enforce treaties, and prevent internal fragmentation, the United States required a government with real authority. The Electoral College, designed to insulate presidential selection from pure populism while ensuring regional balance, reflected the founders’ fear of both mob rule and aristocratic control. The Treaty of Paris (1783), which formally ended the war, granted the U.S. vast western territory, but its recognition by Britain and European powers hinged on the emerging American government's ability to govern territory, enforce laws, and project authority. Their vision, embodied in Alexander Hamilton’s financial program, called for a centralized bank, assumption of state debts, and protective tariffs—policies that favored industrial development and financial integration. Hamilton argued that a robust federal fiscal system was essential to national credit and international credibility, a belief rooted in the economic volatility of the Articles era, when states routinely defaulted on debts and printed paper money without oversight. By contrast, Southern planters and frontier settlers viewed centralized economic control with suspicion. They
