Yet these tools presuppose legal clarity and global adoption, neither guaranteed. The future may see hybrid models: physical sheet music preserved in niche communities, digital works governed by layered licenses (creative commons, AI-specific terms), and AI-generated content subject to mandatory attribution and opt-out mechanisms.
