Yet recent scholarship, drawing on trench diaries and ordnance records, shows that some units achieved tactical success despite overarching strategic failure. Similarly, the use of poison gas—first deployed by Germany at Ypres in 1915—remains morally contested. While initially seen as a "humane" alternative to static machine-gun fire, gas attacks caused indiscriminate suffering, violating emerging norms of warfare and prompting retaliatory use.
