The manuscript's earliest layers emerge from a Jewish apocalyptic milieu, where esoteric knowledge—divine revelations, celestial hierarchies, and cosmic judgment—was guarded by priestly and prophetic elites. Enoch's scroll, preserved in the Ethiopian canon (as *Kitáb 𐩂𐩨𐩣𐩪*), and partially referenced in early Christian and rabbinic sources, reflects a worldview in which the divine realm is actively engaged with human history, mediated through visionary encounters. The Ethiopian Orthodox Church, preserving the full 36-book corpus (called **Ethiopic Enoch**), maintained continuity through monastic scholarship, safeguarding texts deemed heretical elsewhere. This preservation was not passive; it reflected a deliberate theological stance, rooted in the belief that Enoch contained truths beyond the reach of orthodox institutional theology. Geopolitically, the book's trajectory mirrors the shifting centers of power in the ancient Near East. Its composition in Judea occurred during a period when Jewish identity was being renegotiated under foreign rule—first Seleucid, then Roman. The Book of Enoch's vivid depiction of divine judgment against the "wicked" and its elaborate celestial court system may have functioned not merely as theological speculation, but as a spiritual resistance narrative. In a world where temple authority was compromised and divine favor seemingly withdrawn, Enoch's revelations offered a framework for understanding suffering, justice, and ultimate vindication—offering coherence to a fractured community. The Ethiopian preservation, enabled by the region's relative isolation and strong Christian tradition, underscores how economic peripheries could act as custodians of canonical dissent. The 19th and 20th centuries

witnessed a scholarly renaissance that recontextualized Enoch from obscurity to significance. The discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls in the Qumran caves revealed multiple Enochic texts—1QEnoch, 4QEnoch, 5QEnoch—dating from the 3rd century BCE to 1st century CE, confirming its status as a living tradition long before widespread acceptance or rejection. These scrolls demonstrated that Enochic thought was not marginal among Jewish sects but deeply integrated into the Dead Sea Scroll community’s eschatological framework. Yet its survival in Ethiopia, its scholarly excavation in Qumran, and its intermittent revival in modern theology reveal the resilience of alternative spiritual narratives. First, continued archaeological and textual discoveries—especially in understudied regions like the Judean desert or Ethiopian monastic archives—may uncover new variants or lost sections, deepening our understanding of its evolution. Second, interdisciplinary research integrating theology, anthropology, and digital humanities promises to decode its symbolic systems, revealing how ancient cosmologies continue to shape contemporary worldviews. Third, as global religious landscapes shift toward pluralism and spiritual hybridity, Enoch's vision of a transcendent, participatory divine order may resonate anew, offering frameworks for grappling with existential uncertainty.
