In sub-Saharan Africa, access to formal early education remains fragmented, and worksheets are often imported or adapted from global publishers. In Kenya, for example, NGOs like Save the Children distribute low-cost, locally translated worksheets to support community-based preschools. These materials blend basic numeracy with cultural narratives—storybooks featuring local folklore—aiming to bridge home and school knowledge. Yet resource constraints limit customization, resulting in generic content that may not resonate with diverse ethnic and linguistic groups. India presents a paradox: while early childhood education is legally mandated, implementation is uneven. In metropolitan cities, elite preschools deploy digital worksheets with AI-driven personalization, while rural centers rely on printed, teacher-created materials—often in Hindi or regional languages but lacking pedagogical rigor. The National Early Childhood Care and Education Policy (2013) advocates for “holistic development,” yet enforcement is weak, and worksheet proliferation continues unchecked, driven by parental aspirations for cognitive advantage in competitive school admissions.
