Long before the painted cottage and the wolf in red, the tale of Little Red Riding Hood emerged not as a children's fable, but as a chilling social chronicle rooted in the turbulent fabric of early modern Europe. Its origins stretch deep into the 17th-century French countryside, where famine, patriarchal authority, and the rise of state surveillance converged to give birth to a narrative far darker than bedtime stories suggest.
