The Ministry of Education’s 2011 revisions to the national curriculum explicitly incorporated

multisensory techniques, reflecting a blend of indigenous pedagogical values and international evidence. In South Korea, where academic pressure is intense, schools have adopted modified Gillingham modules to support students with specific learning disorders, often integrating them with technology-based adaptive learning platforms. This hybrid approach aligns with Korea's focus on STEM and cognitive efficiency but raises concerns about equity, as access remains uneven across urban and rural areas. In sub-

Saharan Africa, international NGOs have piloted community-based versions of the program, training local educators in low-resource settings using low-tech, multisensory tools like sand trays, letter tiles, and rhythmic repetition. These adaptations respect linguistic diversity—many African languages have non-alphabetic or syllabic systems—and emphasize oral fluency as a gateway to written literacy. Early evaluations show promising literacy gains, though sustainability depends on ongoing teacher support and policy buy-in.

In Europe, countries like the Netherlands and Sweden have integrated Ortons Gillingham principles into inclusive education frameworks, often combining them with Universal
