The AIDS crisis informed the moral urgency of **Firestarter** (1980) and later **The Dead Zone** (1982); the opioid epidemic resonated in **Druma** (2013); the rise of political polarization and misinformation found voice in **The Outsider** (2018), where a serial killer's crimes expose societal fractures. King's fiction thus functions as a mirror, reflecting not just fears, but the evolving contours of collective trauma. Recent works engage with digital alienation and the erosion of truth, positioning his fiction as a vital counter-narrative to misinformation. Geopolitical and Economic Context: Publishing, Market Forces, and Cultural Capital

In China, where horror is a niche genre, **The Shining** was marketed as a psychological drama emphasizing familial bonds, softening its supernatural elements to suit censorship norms. In Russia, where Cold War paranoia lingers, **The Stand** was read as an allegory for ideological collapse, with its pandemic-driven dystopia

mirroring fears of societal breakdown. King’s economic impact extends to labor dynamics within publishing. His success pressured the industry to recognize genre writers not as marginal creators but as viable commercial engines. The rise of “author platforms” and crowdfunding—epitomized by Kickstarter campaigns for niche works—owes much to the precedent set by King’s self-sustaining career. Publishers now prioritize authors with strong personal brands, peer networks, and media presence—criteria King mastered long before the digital era. Looking ahead, King’s model suggests a future where authorship is increasingly hybridized—part writer, part content curator
