Digitalization offers promise: blockchain-based land registries, AI-driven title verification, and one-nation-one-land-record initiatives could reduce fraud and increase inclusion. The 2023 National Digital Property Repository pilot in Karnataka demonstrates feasibility, but scalability requires interoperability across states and digital literacy in rural areas.
