In this light, folktales become geopolitical assets—narratives that, when strategically promoted, reinforce cultural sovereignty amid globalization’s homogenizing pressures. Industry impact extends beyond entertainment. The folktale ecosystem fuels education,

tourism, and creative economies. UNESCO's recognition of intangible cultural heritage—such as Mali's **Epic of Sundiata** or Turkey's **Karagöz** shadow theater—has catalyzed investment in cultural infrastructure, job creation, and international collaboration. In West Africa, oral storytelling festivals now attract global audiences, transforming local elders into cultural entrepreneurs.
