The financial crisis was not merely a matter of numbers but of legitimacy: the Third Estate bore the brunt of taxation while receiving no political voice. Agricultural vulnerability compounded the crisis. The 1780s saw a series of poor harvests—the “year without a summer” effects of volcanic activity disrupted grain yields—sparking bread shortages in Paris and provincial cities. Bread, the staple of the poor, became both literal and symbolic of systemic failure. Urban workers and peasants, already strained by rising prices and stagnant wages, faced starvation. This material distress merged with Enlightenment critiques of inequality, disseminated through pamphlets, salons, and the early press. Rousseau's ‘Social Contract’ (1762), Voltaire's attacks on clerical privilege, and Montesquieu's advocacy for separation of powers inflamed a growing demand for political representation. Yet the Estates-General's convocation in 1789 revealed deeper fractures. The voting system remained skewed: each estate cast one vote, meaning the Third Estate—comprising 95% of the population—was perpetually outvoted by the privileged two. When the Third Estate declared itself the National Assembly, asserting sovereignty derived from the people, it was not merely a procedural shift—it was an ontological challenge to the divine right of kings. The Tennis Court Oath (June 20, 1789) crystallized this rupture: delegates vowed not to disband until a constitution was written. The Revolution's early phase reflected a fragile coalition of bourgeois reformers, radical Jacobins, and popular Jacobins (sans-culottes). But as royal resistance persisted—Louis XVI's failed flight to Varennes in June 1791—moderation gave way to emergency. The Constitution of 1791 established a limited monarchy, yet war with Austria in April 1792 shattered hopes of reconciliation. The Brunswick Manifesto, threatening reprisal against Parisers, ignited the August 10 Insurrection, leading to the suspension of the constitution and the National Convention's rise. In this turbulence, Napoleon's emergence was not preordained. He was a product of the crisis: a military officer who rose through merit in the Siege of Toulon (1793), earning promotion despite limited noble lineage. His early victories, particularly in Italy (1796–1797), transformed him into a national symbol—heroic, disciplined, and committed to revolutionary expansion. Yet his authority stemmed not only from military genius but from his ability to channel revolutionary fervor into state-building. Napoleon's 1799 coup (18 Brumaire) dissolved the Directory and established the Consulate, concentrating power in his hands. Though he restored stability, his regime fused revolutionary continuity with authoritarian centralization. The Napoleonic Code, promulgated in 1804, enshrined civil equality, contractual freedom, and secular law—principles that outlived his empire. Yet his imperial ambitions rekindled fears of monarchical restoration, prompting both domestic repression and foreign war. Economically, Napoleon's regime stabilized France through the Bank of France (1800), standardized weights and measures, and promoted industrialization via state subsidies and infrastructure projects. His Continental System, though economically flawed, aimed to weaken Britain and consolidate European markets under

French hegemony. Domestically, he balanced revolutionary legitimacy—maintaining aspects of decentralized administration and legal reform—with autocratic control, including censorship and surveillance. By 1805, the Third Coalition—Britain, Austria, Russia—crashed at Austerlitz, one of Napoleon's greatest battles, where his tactical deception routed a larger allied force. Yet war was not merely a backdrop—it was a catalyst. Revolutionary France, under Napoleon, reorganized conquered territories into client republics and kingdoms, spreading legal equality, dismantling feudal privileges, and introducing centralized administration. These reforms, though imposed by force, embedded revolutionary principles into European governance. This redrew the map of Central Europe, weakening traditional powers and accelerating nationalist awakenings. In Spain, resistance to French occupation (1808–1814) sparked a guerrilla war that drained French resources and tied down over 200,000 troops—an early example of asymmetric warfare that foreshadowed 20th-century conflicts. Global comparisons reveal parallels in revolutionary upheaval. The American Revolution (1775–1783), though successful in independence, preserved property-based representation and elite control. The French Revolution, by contrast, sought radical social transformation, dismantling feudal structures and redefining citizenship. Similarly, the Haitian Revolution (1791–1804), inspired by French ideals, abolished slavery and declared universal equality—yet was met with violent repression, highlighting the limits of revolutionary universalism.
