Such spatiality makes these insults not only expressive but performative, reinforcing social boundaries through embodied language. In countries where Deaf rights are enshrined—such as Sweden, Norway, and parts of Canada—sign languages enjoy official status, and Deaf communities wield growing cultural influence. Here, insults often target systemic neglect rather than individual identity: mocking inaccessible public services, dismissive policies, or media stereotypes. In contrast, in nations where sign language remains unrecognized—such as parts of Southeast Asia, sub-Saharan Africa, and Latin America—insults frequently target linguistic invisibility itself, mocking the use of gestures in formal spaces or ridiculing Deaf people’s attempts to assert linguistic equality. In China, for example, a 2020 study of urban Deaf communities revealed a growing corpus of insults targeting the slow pace of policy reform. A common form involves exaggerated signing of “wait,” performed with exaggerated slowness, accompanied by a mock-serious expression and a backward head tilt—ridiculing bureaucratic inertia as a personal failing. This reflects a broader tension: while China has made strides in sign language education, Deaf citizens remain marginalized, and insults serve as both cultural expression and quiet protest. In Japan, where auditory-oral education persists in many institutions, insults often center on “otherness”—mocking the use of sign or facial expressions as “wrong” or “childish.” These reflect a society still grappling with Deaf identity, where sign language is often viewed as supplementary rather than primary. The insults, then, are not just linguistic—they are ideological, reinforcing a dominant narrative of assimilation. Economic factors further shape

these dynamics. In wealthier nations with robust Deaf services, insults may focus on identity affirmation and cultural pride. In lower-income contexts, they often reflect practical exclusion: mockery of assistive devices, ridicule of sign language use in schools, or taunting over limited access to education. Globalization compounds these patterns—social media amplifies local insults into transnational discourse, sometimes fostering solidarity, but also enabling the spread of harmful stereotypes across borders.

Industry Impact: Insults in Media, Education, and Public Discourse

The media ecosystem plays a dual role in the life of sign language insults: on one hand, they are often erased or misrepresented; on the other, they gain visibility through viral moments, documentaries, and activist campaigns. The line between cultural resistance and harmful speech is fraught. Dr. Amira El-Sayed, a professor of disability studies at the University of Cape Town, notes: "We must distinguish between insults that affirm identity and those that perpetuate harm. Context matters deeply—what is empowering in one setting may be oppressive in another." Media scholars add another layer: the commodification of Deaf culture.
