**A World in Disarray: American Foreign Policy and the Crisis of the Old Order**

The arc of American foreign policy over the past half-century has been one of gradual unraveling—no sudden collapse, but a tectonic shift beneath the surface. The post-World War II era, anchored in a bipolar world order, saw the United States emerge not merely as a superpower but as the architect of a rules-based international system: Bretton Woods institutions, NATO, UN frameworks, and a network of alliances designed to contain Soviet expansion while projecting stability. Yet since the early 2000s, this edifice has eroded—not through a single crisis, but through the cumulative weight of strategic miscalculations, structural economic contradictions, ideological fatigue, and the rise of multipolar challengers. Today, the old order is not just contested—it is unraveling, leaving American foreign policy adrift in a maelstrom of uncertainty. The origins of this disarray trace back to the end of the Cold War, when the absence of a peer competitor created what political theorists call a “hegemonic moment.” With the Soviet Union dissolved by 1991, Washington entered a period of unchallenged primacy, often described as the “unipolar instant.” For a time, American foreign policy reflected confidence in liberal universalism: democracy promotion, free markets, human rights as foreign policy imperatives. The 1990s saw interventions in the Balkans framed as moral duties, economic engagement with China as an inevitable integration, and military dominance in the Gulf as a demonstration of resolute leadership. Yet this moment was never based on organic consensus. It was sustained by a specific historical conjuncture—American industrial primacy, a unified Democratic and Republican foreign policy establishment, and a public largely supportive of global engagement. By the 2000s, cracks began to show. The invasions of Afghanistan and Iraq, justified through flawed intelligence and expansive interpretations of national security, exposed the limits of unilateral interventionism. The wars drained resources, eroded public trust, and radicalized populations, fueling insurgencies that outlasted U.S. troop presence. More fundamentally, they revealed a growing disconnect between American strategic culture and the realities of a world where state sovereignty, non-state actors, and asymmetric warfare redefined conflict. The “War on Terror” became a self-perpetuating cycle, diverting attention from emerging structural challenges: China’s long-term economic ascent, Russia’s resurgence under Putin, and the diffusion of technological power enabling challenger states to project influence without matching Western military footprints. Economically, the old order was already strained. The U.S. industrial base, the backbone of postwar prosperity, had been hollowed by globalization and automation. Manufacturing decline, offshoring, and deindustrialization hollowed out the middle class, creating a domestic base of economic anxiety. This domestic strain reshaped foreign policy priorities. From the 2010s onward, trade policy shifted from liberal integration to protectionism and strategic competition. The Trans-Pacific Partnership’s collapse, the renegotiation of NAFTA into USMCA, and the imposition of tariffs on China reflected a growing recognition that economic statecraft was no longer a side note but central to geopolitical rivalry. Yet this recalibration was often reactive, lacking a coherent long-term framework. The rise of China has been the most consequential challenge to the American order. Unlike any peer competitor before it, China combines state-led capitalism with technological innovation, exporting infrastructure, surveillance tools, and digital governance models across the Global South. Through the Belt and Road Initiative, Beijing has built ports, railways, and energy networks that extend economic leverage deep into Africa, Southeast Asia, and Latin America—areas once dominated by U.S. influence. The Chinese model offers an alternative to liberal democracy, appealing to regimes and populations wary of Western conditionality. This is not merely economic competition; it is a systemic challenge to the ideological foundations of the American century. Russia, though smaller in economic scale, has exploited vulnerabilities in Western unity. Putin’s Russia has weaponized information warfare, cyber operations, and energy dependencies to destabilize democracies, most notably during the 2016 U.S. election and the full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022. Moscow’s actions reflect a revanchist vision: to reverse NATO expansion, reassert influence over former Soviet space, and test U.S. resolve. The war in Ukraine has become a proxy battlefield, exposing NATO’s cohesion while revealing American strategic hesitation—particularly in the early phase—rooted in domestic political constraints and a reluctance to commit sustained ground forces. Meanwhile, regional powers—India, Turkey, Iran, Saudi Arabia—have asserted greater autonomy, forging multi-alignment foreign policies that reject binary alignment with Washington. This fragmentation undermines the predictability of U.S. alliances, once assumed stable. The Abraham Accords, normalization with Vietnam, and quiet overtures to Gulf states signal adaptation, but they also reflect a diminished ability to shape outcomes through traditional leverage. The old order’s hallmark—U.S. primacy enforced through overwhelming power and institutional consensus—has given way to a more diffuse, contested landscape. The crisis of the old order is not confined to geopolitics. It is embedded in institutions. The United Nations, once a forum for consensus, now frequently paralyzed by vetoes and veto-abuse. The World Trade Organization’s dispute mechanism crippled by appointment blockages. The International Monetary Fund, designed for stability, struggles with debt crises in low-income nations overwhelmed by climate shocks and pandemic aftereffects. These institutions, once pillars of American-led

governance, now reflect the gridlock of a world where consensus is harder to achieve, and unilateralism gains traction. For American foreign policy, the consequences are profound and multifaceted. The post-9/11 model of interventionism, built on security threats and nation-building, has been discredited by cost and outcome. The pivot to great power competition with China and Russia reorients strategy but risks overextension—pushing Washington into a zero-sum game with no clear exit. Domestic polarization further complicates continuity: foreign policy becomes politicized, with administrations reversing course on alliances, climate accords, and arms control treaties. The Biden administration’s emphasis on “democracy alliances” and economic resilience marks a return to institutionalism, but it faces skepticism at home and mistrust abroad.
