These variations underscore a key insight: palm sign language is not monolithic. It is a mosaic of local knowledge, shaped by geography, history, and power. The rise of digital platforms has further transformed its ecology. Social media—particularly TikTok and YouTube—has become an unexpected arena for survival and innovation. Viral short videos show Deaf dancers in rural Bangladesh using palm gestures synchronized to music, blending traditional palm sign with contemporary performance. These digital expressions not only reach global audiences but create transnational communities of practice, where learners from Kenya, Canada, and Colombia exchange techniques and validate regional forms. Yet digital visibility brings new risks. Misrepresentation, appropriation, and algorithmic bias threaten authenticity. A 2024 study by the Global Deaf Tech Network found that AI models trained on public content often misclassify palm sign as noise or gesture, failing to recognize culturally specific patterns. This not only excludes users from accessible services but reinforces linguistic invisibility. In Nigeria, during the 1970s, Deaf activists in Lagos formed underground networks, using palm signs in clandestine meetings to organize against discriminatory policies. The *International Coalition of Deaf Palm Sign Users* (ICDPSU), founded in 2018, connects grassroots groups across Africa, Asia, and the Americas, promoting documentation, education, and legal recognition. Their work underscores a critical truth: palm sign is not a relic, but a living language, shaped by history yet evolving with purpose.
