The language evolved through Middle Irish (c. 6th–12th centuries), marked by syntactic simplification but preserved archaisms—such as the use of **-t** nominal suffixes and a robust inflectional system—that link it directly to the ancient tongue. Welsh, though influenced by Anglo-Norman and later English, retained a robust grammatical core, with its tripartite verb system and case distinctions offering scholars a living window into Celtic linguistic mechanics. Scottish Gaelic, spoken across the Highlands and Islands, evolved under distinct pressures—Clan-based social structures, later Highland Clearances—shaping a dialectal diversity that still defies easy categorization.
