The Marcos dictatorship (1965–1986), with its martial law, disappearances, and torture centers, birthed a new wave of terror-infused folklore. The **aswang** took on new forms: not just a monster, but a figure of state spies, corrupt officials, or even relatives who vanish without trace. In Quezon City’s slums, residents recount tales of **mangkukulam**—witch-doctors who summon spirits to exact revenge on those who break communal norms—echoing the era’s paranoia and fractured trust. These stories are not metaphorical; they are testimonies, encoded in myth to survive censorship. Anthropologist Anna Glacio notes that in such contexts, ghost narratives serve as a cultural immune system—preserving memory when official records are destroyed. The geopolitical and economic context of the Philippines amplifies the resonance of these tales. As a developing nation grappling with neocolonial economic dependencies, environmental degradation, and recurring natural disasters, the archipelago remains a place where the boundary between life and death feels porous. Typhoons drag entire families to their deaths in the sea; mining operations destabilize ancestral lands; urbanization displaces communities into concrete jungles where traditional spirits are said to grow restless. The **bathala**—the supreme deity in pre-colonial belief—now often appears not as a distant creator, but as a silent witness, watching as modernity erodes the sacred. However, critics warn of cultural appropriation—when sacred beliefs are reduced to entertainment—eroding authenticity. From a psychological and neuroanthropological standpoint, the persistence of ghost stories speaks to human cognitive biases.
