The roots of the Armenian genocide lie in the long arc of imperial decline and ethno-national tension within the late Ottoman Empire. By the 19th century, the empire—once a multi-ethnic bulwark—was unraveling under pressure from nationalist movements, European imperial encroachment, and internal reform attempts that disproportionately empowered non-Turkic minorities. The initial phase, beginning April 24, 1915—marked as the day of mass arrests in Constantinople—evolved into a coordinated campaign across Anatolia: deportations, massacres, forced marches into the Syrian desert, and the systematic destruction of Armenian communities. Experts emphasize that this was not merely a byproduct of war chaos but a deliberate strategy. Turkish archives, though partially destroyed or suppressed, combined with survivor testimonies, foreign diplomatic cables, and later forensic studies to reveal premeditation. The Special Organization—paramilitary units like the Teşkilat-ı Mahsusa—acted as mobile killing squads, often composed of former outlaws and radicalized youth. These forces operated with impunity, enabled by the Ottoman state's delegitimization of Armenian identity as “un-Ottoman” and “foreign.”

## **Geopolitical and Economic Context: War, Resources, and Imperial Ambition**

The genocide unfolded against the backdrop of imperial collapse and geopolitical realignment. The Ottoman Empire, once a dominant force in the Middle East, was weakened by military defeats, economic stagnation, and internal fragmentation. The war intensified these vulnerabilities: the Ottomans sought to consolidate control over Anatolia, eliminate perceived disloyalty, and seize land and assets. Armenian communities, often economically dynamic and tied to trade networks, represented both a symbolic and material target. Economic motives were explicit. Property seizures, confiscation of businesses, and the redistribution of Armenian assets to Muslim settlers and state-aligned actors were integral to the extermination program. Scholars such as Taner Akçam and Mark Arsenius have demonstrated how the genocide functioned as a mechanism of class and ethnic cleansing, dismantling a non-Turkic economic class to solidify Turkish dominance. The Great Powers' response further contextualizes the tragedy. While Allied powers condemned the violence, strategic interests—particularly Britain and France's concern over Russian influence in the Eastern Mediterranean—limited meaningful intervention. The genocide occurred during a global conflict where moral imperatives were overshadowed by realpolitik. The absence of enforcement mechanisms at the nascent League of Nations underscored the fragility of early international human rights frameworks.

The displacement of Armenians, Assyrians, and Greeks set precedents for population transfers that would recur in 20th-century conflicts.

The most enduring obstacle to recognition remains denial, orchestrated by successive Turkish governments. Official narratives frame the deaths as wartime casualties, rejecting genocide allegations as biased and politically motivated. This denial is institutionalized through laws criminalizing criticism of state actions related to 1915, silencing scholars, journalists, and survivors' descendants. Yet, grassroots movements—Armenian diaspora networks, human rights organizations, and international advocates—have sustained memory through education, memorials, and legal challenges. The 2019 European Parliament resolution formally recognizing the genocide as such marked a symbolic victory, but legal redress remains elusive. For Armenians, the genocide is not merely a historical wound but a living trauma. The loss of ancestral lands, cultural institutions, and familial continuity has shaped identity and resilience. As historian Richard Hovannisian observes, the genocide forged a diaspora that carries both memory and responsibility—a transnational community committed to remembrance and justice.
