This contrasts sharply with Western liberal norms, exposing a global divide in what counts as legitimate behavioural evidence. Industry impact is equally transformative. Pharmaceuticals rely on standardized clinical trials (e.g., DSM-5 criteria) to validate psychotropic drugs, yet these trials often exclude marginalized populations, skewing efficacy data. In

education, high-stakes testing systems (e.g., PISA, SAT) export standardized measurement globally, often at the expense of local pedagogical values. Corporate wellbeing programs deploy biometric and behavioural analytics to “optimize” employee performance, blurring therapeutic intent with productivity surveillance. Each domain reflects a power-laden negotiation: who defines the behaviour to measure, and for what purpose? Expert voices remain divided.
