expense of national autonomy. The region's geopolitical vulnerability became apparent in Cold War proxy conflicts—Chile's 1973 coup, Argentina's Dirty War, Peru's internal armed conflict—where superpower rivalries exacerbated domestic repression and eroded democratic legitimacy. Economically, the late 20th century brought structural adjustment programs imposed by the IMF and World Bank, compelling privatization, deregulation, and trade liberalization. While these policies aimed to stabilize economies, they often deepened inequality, dismantling state-led development models and exposing vulnerable populations to market shocks. The 1980s debt crisis, the 1990s commodity boom, and the 2000s commodity supercycle each left indelible marks: cycles of growth followed by bust, with populations bearing the social costs of fiscal austerity and speculative capital.
