This ancient praxis—learning through shared struggle—resonates deeply in today’s local churches, especially in the Global South. In rural Uganda, as in Antioch, the church remains a primary site of social infrastructure. When crops fail or illness strikes, the congregation responds not with charity alone, but with collective care: pooling food,

organizing healing prayer cycles, and creating childcare cooperatives. These acts are not incidental; they are spiritual disciplines that shape maturity. As theologian Lesslie Newbigin observed, true discipleship is “a way of life,” not a set of doctrines. In Kibera, where 70% of residents live below the poverty line, such embodied discipleship is not idealistic—it is existential.
