In contrast, Nordic and East Asian media — where consensus-building and nuance are culturally prized — employ more frequent conditional and subjunctive-like phrasing, even in English. Swedish public broadcasters, for example, routinely use “vad skulle man döa” (“what one might assume”) in risk reporting, mirroring the epistemic caution of the “imperfecto del subjuntivo.” This suggests that linguistic habits are not arbitrary, but deeply embedded in national epistemologies — and that journalistic practice is as much a cultural act as a professional one. In post-Soviet states, where state-controlled narratives dominate, the imperfect subjunctivo has re-emerged as a subversive tool. Ukrainian journalists covering the war with Russia, for instance, use qualifying clauses not out of weakness, but as a rhetorical shield: “It appears Russian forces advanced...”, “One possibility is that civilian infrastructure was targeted...” This linguistic posture protects both the journalist and the truth from immediate retaliation.
