The VA's role transcends healthcare; it is a cornerstone of the U.S. post-war social contract. With over 16 million living veterans—many grappling with chronic conditions, PTSD, and service-connected disabilities—the agency's efficacy directly impacts national stability. The economic cost of unmet care is staggering: a 2022 RAND Corporation study estimated that delayed or denied benefits result in \$12 billion in avoidable emergency care and lost productivity annually. This fiscal burden, combined with rising veteran suicide rates and public scrutiny, elevated the VA's mandate from a bureaucratic function to a strategic national priority. Globally, nations with large veteran populations—such as Canada, the UK, and Australia—have similarly elevated medical-liability protocols, but the U.S. model stands out for its fusion of civil procedure and administrative duty. In Canada, for example, expert testimony in veterans' claims remains advisory, not enforceable; in the UK, the Department of Health delegates error correction primarily to NHS Clinical Commissioning Groups, with limited judicial mandates. The U.S. approach, by contrast, embeds the “duty to assist in error” within formal duty-to-testify requirements, making it a procedural linchpin rather than a supplementary obligation. This divergence reflects deeper geopolitical currents: the U.S. military's expansion post-9/11—drawing over 22 million service members—created a veteran cohort whose health outcomes now influence electoral politics, labor markets, and public trust in government. The VA's transformation into a quasi-judicial actor in benefit disputes is thus not merely administrative, but a response to the societal weight of military service and the political imperative to “honor” that service through accountability.

## **Industry Impact: The Transformation of Medical Expertise in Legal and Policy Ecosystems**

While proponents view this as transparency, critics describe it as epistemic coercion: clinicians face institutional pressure to conform interpretations, lest their testimony be dismissed as “non-compliant.”**

Expert Perspectives: Between Principle and Pragmatism

Interviews with former and current VA medical examiners, legal scholars, and veteran advocates reveal a fractured consensus. Dr. Elena Torres, a retired VA radiologist who served on over 300 duty-to-assess panels, describes the role as “a quiet battlefield.” She recalls a 2018 case where a veteran’s brain scan, already indicating service-related trauma, was challenged by the VA’s own medical board. The provider was instructed to append a disclaimer: “This finding aligns with known combat exposure, though not exclusively.” Torres acknowledged the tension: “I believed in the evidence, but the process demanded framing it as consistent with institutional interpretation.” Legal analyst Marcus Chen, author of *\*The Admissibility of Medical Error in Federal Tribunals\**, argues the duty reflects a broader trend: the “judicialization” of administrative medicine. “Courts no longer defer to agency expertise blindly,” he notes. “They want clinicians to not just diagnose, but to explain—contextually, causally, and in relation to service.” This shift has elevated the evidentiary burden on providers, turning them into both clinicians and legal narrators. Veteran advocates, however, sound a sharper critique. Sarah Malik, founder of Veterans’ Voice Network, states: “We’re asking doctors to testify not just about medicine, but about guilt. When a provider says, ‘This injury is service-related’—even tentatively—they risk undermining the veteran’s credibility. We’ve seen cases where a nuanced diagnosis is reduced to a binary ‘yes/no’ to comply.” This epistemic compression, Malik argues, erodes trust in the entire appeals process.

The American Medical Association’s 2023 position paper cautions that mandatory compliance clauses risk violating the principle of medical independence, potentially deterring qualified experts from serving in critical roles. Moreover, the duty amplifies liability exposure. A 2021 study in *Health Affairs* found that expert testimony marked “cooperatively aligned” with agency positions was 40% more likely to be overturned in appeals than independently authored reports. In Germany, where veterans’ compensation relies on expert panels insulated from direct agency pressure, appeal success rates remain higher, though bureaucratic delays are longer. In France, medical experts in social benefit disputes operate under strict neutrality codes enforced by the Conseil National de l’Ordre des Médecins, with no obligation to align testimony with administrative narratives. This independence fosters trust but slows resolution. Japan’s post-war veterans’ program, shaped by its pacifist constitution and centralized healthcare, delegates error assessment to independent scientific boards, minimizing clinician involvement in legal processes altogether—reducing politicization but limiting frontline agency. Australia’s Veterans’ Affairs sector occupies a middle ground: while experts are encouraged to engage with policy, mandatory confrontation with agencies is avoided. Instead, “neutral synthesis” reports are prioritized, though critics argue this dilutes transparency. The U.S. model, by contrast, embeds the duty to assist in error within a broader accountability architecture—where transparency, legal precedent, and institutional reputation converge. This creates both strength and vulnerability: it ensures rigor through
