Yet the medieval synthesis—dominant for a millennium—was not unchallenged. The Protestant Reformation ignited a hermeneutic revolution that redefined reception itself. Martin Luther's insistence on **sola scriptura** demanded direct, unfiltered access to the text, catalyzing vernacular translations and democratizing interpretation. But Luther's hermeneutics were not purely individualistic; they were embedded in a theological vision of grace and *sola fide*, where scripture served as a mirror of divine truth rather than a flexible cultural artifact. His approach, while liberating, also risked reductionism—reducing complex texts to doctrinal signposts. The Catholic Counter-Reformation responded with renewed emphasis on tradition and magisterial authority, yet even here, new interpretive currents emerged. The Jesuits, through figures like Robert Bellarmine, developed rigorous historical-critical methods, not to undermine faith, but to defend it against Protestant critiques. This tension—between textual autonomy and institutional authority—remains a defining fault line in *hermeneutica biblica*. The Enlightenment and rise of historical-critical method in the 18th and 19th centuries marked a tectonic shift. Scholars such as Jean Astruc and later Julius Wellhausen applied philological and archaeological tools to biblical texts, exposing their composite origins, multiple authorship, and historical contexts. Wellhausen's **Prolegomena to the History of Israel** argued for a late composition of much of the Pentateuch, challenging literalist readings and destabilizing centuries of scriptural orthodoxy. This critical hermeneutic—often labeled “higher criticism”—was met with fierce

resistance from conservative religious circles and, later, from secular ideologies that co-opted it to deconstruct religious meaning altogether. Yet this critical turn did not extinguish faith-based interpretation; rather, it diversified the hermeneutic field. The 20th century saw the rise of existential, liberation, and feminist hermeneutics—each reorienting scripture through new lenses. Dietrich Bonhoeffer’s **The Cost of Discipleship** reframed biblical texts as existential summons, not doctrinal dogma. Latin American liberation theologians like Gustavo Gutiérrez interpreted the Exodus and Gospels through the prism of poverty and oppression, transforming scripture into a tool of social critique. Feminist scholars such as Elisabeth Schüssler Fiorenza exposed patriarchal biases in traditional readings, recovering marginalized voices from figures like Mary Magdalene to Deborah. In the Islamic world, a parallel evolution unfolded in tafsir traditions, where hermeneutica biblica clie found both contrast and convergence. Meanwhile, cognitive scientists of religion, such as Justin Barrett, explore how human psychology predisposes us to perceive divine agency in texts, shaping reception patterns across cultures. Controversies remain acute. Debates over textual authenticity—such as the Dead Sea Scrolls' revelations about the Hebrew Bible's transmission—challenge traditional canons. Gendered readings continue to divide: complementarianism versus egalitarian interpretations, often rooted in hermeneutical assumptions about authorship and authority.
