But the deeper vulnerability lies in ecological fragility and cultural erosion. As development pressures mount—driven by tourism, housing demand, and climate migration—fishing guides face pressure to expand capacity, sometimes at odds with conservation goals. This latter path aligns with broader shifts in environmental governance: decentralization, recognition of Indigenous knowledge, and a redefinition of value beyond economic extraction.
