Yet, as Tevai notes, “Tourists don’t always read the fine print. They come for the view, not the wisdom.” This dissonance underscores a core challenge: how to educate without

perspective, Haleakalā presents
unique environmental
vulnerabilities. The fragile alpine
ecosystem supports endemic
species like the Haleakalā
silversword (*Argyroxiphium
sandwicense*), found nowhere
else on Earth. Soil erosion from
