In Brazil, community centers use the model in youth empowerment programs, teaching emotional literacy to reduce violence and strengthen social bonds.

Expert Perspectives: Validation, Critique, and Evolution

Psychologists have offered diverse assessments of Chapman’s model. Dr. Sue Johnson, renowned for Emotionally Focused Therapy, acknowledges its utility in highlighting relational patterns but cautions against rigid typology. “Love languages are not fixed identities,” she warns. “They are dynamic expressions shaped by context, trauma, and growth.” Anthropologists like Dr. David Matsumoto emphasize cultural relativity: while the languages resonate globally, their salience shifts with societal values. that transcend Chapman's taxonomy but resonate with its core: relationality, reciprocity, and continuity. This global mosaic suggests the 18 love languages function not as universal truths, but as a flexible lexicon—one that invites localization, adaptation, and critique.
