The victim’s family argued silence was complicity; critics countered that premature accusations, without legal process, harm reputations. This tension underscores a broader challenge: how to balance victim advocacy with due process, especially when trauma narratives are central but inherently subjective. The rise of “survivor” activism—empowered by social media—has amplified voices once silenced, yet also fueled backlash from educators who feel demonized without context. Risks extend beyond individual cases. The normalization of boundary violations, even in isolated incidents, corrodes institutional credibility. A 2023 OECD survey found that 68% of parents in OECD countries now question teacher-student interactions more than a decade ago, with 43% reporting distrust in school disciplinary systems. This erosion of trust affects student engagement, mental health outcomes, and long-term educational investment. In Chile, a 2022 poll revealed a 27% drop in parental enrollment in public schools following a high-profile abuse scandal, with families citing “fear of institutional failure” as primary reason. The media's role in shaping public perception is both powerful and fraught.
