Christian context navigating tensions between Jewish law, Gentile inclusion, and Roman imperial ideology. proclaimed is not merely individual, but collective—reshaping how communities define membership, justice, and mutual responsibility. In a world where economic exploitation was masked as civic duty, Paul’s message reorients value toward relational integrity and shared dignity. Scholars such as N.T. Wright have emphasized that Paul’s theology reframes history itself: salvation is not a future hope, but a present reality inaugurated in Christ, demanding a radical reorientation of identity. In Ephesians 2:1-10, “alive with Christ” is both a past event (death overcome) and a present reality (spiritual new birth).
