These spaces rejected institutional sterility, favoring warm, lived-in interiors where therapy unfolded in everyday life, not clinical detachment. The German model reflected a societal commitment: mental health was a public good, not a privilege. Similarly, Japan’s post-bubble era (1990s–2000s) witnessed a quiet revolution. With suicide rates soaring and stigma entrenched, small private practices flourished in Tokyo’s Shibuya and Osaka’s Namba districts. These rooms, often converted from living quarters, became havens of discretion—clients attending in the morning, returning to daily life by evening, therapy woven into the rhythm of ordinary existence. The economic rationale for small offices crystallized amid rising urban costs and shifting labor markets. By the 1970s, as globalization accelerated and real estate prices skyrocketed in global cities, large institutional clinics became financially unsustainable for many practitioners.
