In India, accent training is often privatized and market-driven, driven by a burgeoning IT and business process outsourcing sector that demands global communication fluency. The U.S. model, by contrast, is tightly interwoven with capitalist imperatives, where voice becomes a quantifiable asset in human capital valuation. The AATC's future hinges on evolving technological and societal currents. Advances in AI and real-time speech processing are democratizing access—voice analysis apps now offer personalized feedback at scale. This threatens to disrupt traditional coach-led models but also expands opportunity for self-directed learning, particularly in lower-income regions. Yet this decentralization demands new guardrails: without expert oversight, training risks becoming shallow mimicry, undermining the very clarity it seeks to ensure. Moreover, shifting global power dynamics may reshape demand. As BRICS nations and emerging economies gain influence, the U.S.-centric model faces competition not only in accent preference but in redefining what constitutes effective global communication. Could a pluralistic approach—validating multiple accents as equally valid—gain traction, reducing linguistic pressure while enhancing mutual understanding? The AATC's next phase may involve hybrid curricula, blending American precision with regional

authenticity, supported by AI that detects and preserves linguistic nuance. Economically, the course's impact is measurable. Studies by the World Economic Forum estimate that linguistic competence in global English correlates with 15-20% higher leadership effectiveness in multinational teams.
