Anna Jarvis’s vision for Mother’s Day emerged from the ashes of personal loss and national trauma. Her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, had been a “Mother’s Day Work Club” founder during the Civil War, organizing care for wounded soldiers and advocating for public health—values Anna carried into her own activism. In 1908, in response to the deaths of 200 children in West Virginia mining disasters, Anna delivered a fiery speech at St. Andrew’s Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia, declaring: “A mother is a person who gives you life and teaches you how to live.” That day, 500 women gathered to honor mothers, not just as biological figures but as pillars of community resilience.

Yet the date gained national traction only through Anna’s relentless lobbying. By 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed the law establishing the second Sunday in May as Mother’s Day, aligning it with existing Mother’s Day observances in some states. But the early ceremonies were intimate, solemn affairs—no parades, no ads—centered on letters, flowers, and quiet reflection. The commercialization began in earnest during the 1920s, accelerated by Prohibition-era consumerism and the rise of mass media. Companies like Hallmark capitalized on sentiment, turning maternal affection into a marketable commodity. By mid-century, Mother’s Day had become a fixture of American cultural life, spreading globally through media, migration, and multinational corporations. Yet its roots in grief and community endure—in places like rural Kentucky, where families still exchange hand-picked wildflowers and handwritten poems, and in urban Atlanta, where Black churches host “Mother’s Day Unity Services” honoring ancestral matriarchs.

The Economics of Celebration: A Global Market Under Scrutiny

In the U.S., the retail value of Mother’s Day exceeds \$3.8 billion annually, with 85% of gifts purchased by women—though men now claim a growing share, especially in symbolic gestures like cards and tech gadgets. Globally, estimates vary: France spends around €1.2 billion, Japan ~¥700 billion (~\$4.5 billion), and India’s informal market—flower stalls, handmade crafts—drives an estimated \$1.5 billion, though much of this remains unrecorded.

This consumer surge masks a deeper economic truth: the labor of caregiving remains undervalued. The OECD reports that unpaid care work—domestic labor, childcare, elder support—constitutes 12.5% of global GDP, yet carries no formal wage or protection. Mother’s Day, in this light, becomes a performative acknowledgment: a day to buy love, not to compensate the millions—especially women in the Global South—who perform that love daily without pay. In Kenya, migrant flower workers supply 70% of U.S. Mother’s Day roses, yet earn less than \$2/day, their labor critical to the bouquet’s symbolic price. In Brazil, informal care networks dominate maternal support, with women pooling resources, sharing meals, and exchanging emotional labor—no transaction, no credit, but essential cohesion. These contrasts expose the day’s dual nature: a celebration of maternal devotion and a critique of systemic neglect.

Geopolitical Narratives: Motherhood as National Identity

In post-Soviet Russia, Mother’s Day (May 9) was institutionalized during the Cold War as a state-endorsed tribute to women’s wartime sacrifice—mothers of soldiers, nurses, and factory workers. It reinforced a narrative of national endurance, linking maternal strength to state resilience. Today, under Putin, Mother’s Day remains a tool of patriarchy and social control, often co-opted by state media to promote traditional family values,

marginalizing LGBTQ+ families and single mothers.

In South Korea, where birth rates have plummeted to 0.78 children per woman (the world's lowest), Mother's Day has evolved into a bittersweet reckoning. While flowers and chocolates flow, public discourse increasingly centers on the crushing pressure of motherhood in a hyper-competitive society. Activists critique the "motherhood penalty," where women face career loss and social stigma for choosing care over work—turning the day's symbolism into a platform for reform. China's approach reflects its one-child policy legacy and rapid urbanization. Though state media promotes "happy motherhood," surveys reveal rising anxiety: 60% of mothers report chronic stress, and 40% feel emotionally isolated. The government's "Motherly China" campaign attempts to reframe caregiving as civic duty, yet grassroots movements—like the "Empty Nesters" collective—challenge this by advocating for state-supported childcare and eldercare. In Nigeria, motherhood is both sacred and politicized. During military regimes, mothers were venerated as moral anchors; today, they lead protests against police brutality, corruption, and climate neglect. Groups like the Nigerian Mothers for Peace and Development use social media to amplify maternal voices, transforming personal grief into collective action.

Industry Impact: From Roses to Resilience

The commercial machinery of Mother's Day is a global behemoth. In the U.S., The Greenery, a leading floral distributor, reports a 90% spike in Mother's Day orders—\$12 billion spent, with 60% going to small, family-owned shops. Yet this revenue rarely trickles to the workers: the floral industry employs 400,000 U.S. workers, 70% of whom earn below \$15/hour, many without benefits.
