Economically, the phenomenon reflects broader shifts in extreme tourism. Mount Etna is no longer a remote backcountry but a branded destination, marketed through adventure blogs, influencer partnerships, and curated hiking packages. The self-guided trend caters to a demographic seeking authenticity and autonomy—individuals who distrust institutional gatekeepers and prefer direct experience. This aligns with a broader global movement: from Everest's guided summit races to Patagonia's solo treks, climbers increasingly reject top-down control in favor of unfiltered engagement. In Sicily, this shift carries unique weight. Local guides, once central to the tourism economy, now face competition from independent hikers who bypass traditional intermediaries. For many, the “unlicensed” ascent is not recklessness but resistance—an assertion of personal agency against bureaucratic inertia and commercial overreach. Expert perspectives reveal a divided consensus. Geologists and volcanologists emphasize the inherent dangers of unguided ascents. Etna's terrain is deceptively unstable: brittle volcanic rock, sudden ash flows, gas emissions, and shifting lava fields are not static hazards but dynamic threats. Dr. Elena Moretti, a volcanologist at the University of Catania, explains: ‘Even experienced hikers underestimate the rapidity of volcanic changes.

Without real-time monitoring and local expertise, a solo ascent becomes a gamble with geological time.’ Her research, based on field data from over 200 ascents
