Yet critics warn of over-reliance on athletic revenue diverting resources from academic priorities—a concern amplified by debates over NIL deals and transfer portal fluidity. Globally, Notre Dame’s influence extends beyond U.S. borders. International games in London and Mexico City, partnerships with global institutions, and digital outreach position the brand as a transnational entity. This expansion reflects a broader trend: American college football, once insular, now navigates global markets while preserving its unique ethos.
