The poem's most infamous line—"Every woman adores a Fascist, the black shoe in which she rolls"—is not a personal confession alone but a geopolitical assertion, embedding the personal within the machinery of 20th-century authoritarianism. Here, Plath invokes the rise of fascism, her father's identity as a German academic under Nazi Germany, and the broader cultural complicity of intellectual silence. The "black shoe" becomes a symbol of totalitarian control, of a body—especially a female body—subjugated to patriarchal and ideological frameworks. Contextually, "Daddy" emerged in the early 1960s, a decade marked by Cold War paranoia, decolonization, and the second wave of feminism. The U.S. was entrenched in anti-communist hysteria, while Europe grappled with post-war reconstruction and the legacy of fascism. Plath, living in England with her husband Ted Hughes, was part of a transatlantic literary scene that included figures like Anne Sexton and Robert Lowell, who also explored confessional modes. Yet Plath's work diverged in its mythic intensity and linguistic precision. In Iran, during periods of feminist protest, excerpts from "Daddy" have been circulated anonymously, its imagery repurposed to articulate resistance against religious and state patriarchy. Literary agents and publishers began to recognize the market for confessional and psychologically charged work, though often with ambivalence—balancing artistic merit against the trauma narrative’s commercialization. Controversies surround the poem’s reception. Early critics dismissed it as self-indulgent or psychologically opaque, reflecting broader discomfort with women’s rage. Later scholars, particularly in the 1980s and 1990s, reclaimed it as a feminist masterpiece, though debates persist about the limits of its universalization. Some argue that its focus on the white, middle-class female experience risks overshadowing intersecting oppressions, while others insist its power lies in its specificity—that its truth is not universal but deeply felt, and in that, universally resonant. The psychological risks Plath took in writing “Daddy” were profound. She wrote in letters and journals of a mind in crisis, oscillating between clarity and delusion. The poem’s intensity reflects a manic-depressive state, where poetic genius and personal collapse coexisted.
